

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A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Financially, it's been a tough year - especially for Section 8 only agencies. Federal budget woes have deeply impacted the funding of our programs. And yet, we keep on doing our jobs; we work smarter, harder, longer to fulfill our mission of providing decent affordable housing to our vulnerable clients. All of our



members should be proud that they have persevered through this tough climate. While we give out annual awards in special recognition to folks who have gone above and beyond, it is really important that the hard work and dedication of all AZNAHRO members is acknowledged. So, thanks to all of you for what you do. You make a difference.

Why AZNAHRO? Because we save you training dollars. AZNAHRO has responded to our industry's budget woes by continuing to provide training, advocacy and of course, our wonderful conference, at reduced costs. We have cut the conference from a two day event to a one day event; we have moved to a less expensive venue, and kept the conference registration fee lower than it was two years ago. We have provided roundtables for free, and have partnered with training organizations to reduce the cost of classes. One of our missions is to ensure that our members have the leadership skills, education, information and tools to serve communities in a rapidly changing environment. We take this seriously, and hope to amp up our offerings between now and next year's conference. Because of our ability to partner with training organizations, we have been able to save members money by brining classes here to Arizona at reduced registration fees. Because we bring the classes to Arizona, travel expenses are also drastically reduced. MEMBER **HINT:** Want a voice in what training sessions AZNAHRO plans? Join a committee.

During this year, we offered two Family Self Sufficiency Conferences, a free Housing Training in November and Finance training preceding this conference.

Why AZNAHRO? Because we need an organization that advocates for our clients and programs. In last year's program, I said "the irony of our budget woes is that to protect our mission as affordable housing agencies, we need to speak together clearly". Still true. More important than ever. We need to

stand up for our programs – for the good they do for our local economies and for the good they do for the families we serve. As a part of the nation-wide NAHRO organization, and of our Pacific Southwest Region of NAHRO, we have the gravitas. We have the power of a strong organization and the voices of all our members. Let's keep using it. In this year, AZNAHRO partnered with AHADA on our Legislative Paper (available on the web site). Special thanks go to board members Peggy Morales and Valerie Mitchell for their work on the paper. Long-time member and former AZNAHRO President Dan Trozzi was our lone representative at the annual Legislative Conference. He was able to visit with several congressional offices on behalf of Arizona housing agencies during the conference.

Why AZNAHRO? Because YOU can make a difference. AZNAHRO is a member-driven organization. You can participate simply by being a member, but we ask for more from you. We ask for your thoughts, ideas and energy. You can make a huge difference within this organization by volunteering to participate on a committee. Our committees: Housing, Maintenance, Family Self-Sufficiency, Finance, Professional Development, Community Revitalization and Development (CR&D), Member Services, and Communication. Councilwoman Kate Gallego represents District 8, a diverse area that includes parts of East Phoenix, Downtown, South Phoenix and Laveen. As a member of the Phoenix City Council, Kate has focused her energy on economic development and expanding access to light rail.

Kate has brought an entrepreneurial spirit and extensive economic development knowledge to her service on the council. Prior to being elected, Kate worked on Strategic Planning and Economic Development for Salt River Project and earned an MBA in Entrepreneurial Management from the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania. Kate is the only MBA on the Phoenix City Council.

Kate graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Harvard University with a degree in Environmental Studies. She is a member of Temple Solel and is married to former State Representative Ruben Gallego.

PRESTON PRINCE
CEO/Executive Director, Fresno Housing Authority
National NAHRO President

Preston Prince is the CEO/Executive Director for the Fresno Housing Authority, serving over 50,000 residents in California's Central San Joaquin Valley. The Fresno Housing Authority serves the City and County of Fresno and is the 5th largest housing authority in California.

Preston has led the Fresno Housing Authority since 2007. Currently, he serves in various community capacities, including Fresno Housing Education Corps, Fresno 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness, Fresno's Economic Development Corporation, the California State Housing Finance Agency Board of Directors, and many others.

He has over 20 years of experience in housing development and policy, including a master's degree in urban affairs from New School University in New York City. Previously, Preston served as Executive Director for the Aurora Housing Authority in Colorado, where he successfully implemented a mixed-finance development strategy and property management vision for the agency. Earlier, he worked for the Seattle Housing Authority as Senior Housing Development Program Manager and was directly responsible for \$1 billion dollars in re-development efforts, including Holly Park, Rainier Vista, and others.

Since his arrival in Fresno, Preston has overseen the completion of a HOPE VI development, which included 69 mixed finance public housing rental units and a 53 unit single family subdivision. In addition, he secured financing and completed construction on Parc Grove Commons (Phase I and II), a 363 unit mixed finance development and Granada Commons, a 16 unit mixed finance development, among many others. Preston has also successfully overseen the development and financing of over 100 units of permanent supportive housing for the homeless. Under Preston's leadership, the Fresno Housing Authority will successfully renovate over 400 units of public housing, under the new Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) initiative through HUD. Since his arrival in Fresno, over 1,700 units of affordable housing have been developed, bringing over \$248 million of development to the area.

Preston is actively involved with the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO) and currently serves as National President. In addition, he has been a member of the National Board of Governors, National Budget and Administrative Committee, and the National Board of Ethics and Credentialing, as well as serving on various NAHRO Regional Councils. Preston is a successful collaborator, neighborhood builder, social entrepreneur, and ethical leader. Fresno continues to further his efforts to create and sustain vibrant communities in Fresno and across the country, working to end chronic homelessness, and bring awareness to the nexus between housing and education.

2. Approval of Minutes

Capital Fund - We will discuss the financial aspects of the Capital Fund and guidelines (limits) on using Capital Funds for operations.

Ending homelessness is a central goal of President Obama's administration and HUD has been working overtime to provide guidance and technical assistance to the field on how to use both targeted and mainstream resources to accelerate the achievement of this goal. Employee of the Year: Housing

DAWN MARSOLAIS

Housing Program Representative, City of Phoenix Housing Department

awn Marsolais deserves recognition for her work with the HUD/VASH Program in 2013/14. In July 2010, she took on the VASH caseload, which at that time was 335. This caseload serves homeless veterans many who have various and complex issues such as chronic homelessness, PTSD, mental illness or substance abuse issues. Dawn worked closely with over 30 VA staff to ensure veterans issues were quickly addressed to ensure they remained stably housed or in some cases re-housed.

Since Dawn took over, this program grew from 335 vouchers to 695 vouchers, with no additional help. It was "not uncommon for Section 8 supervisors to receive emails and calls from VA staff and veterans staffing how helpful Dawn was getting veterans housed and responding to questions. Dawn has gone above and beyond the duties of a Housing Specialist to ensure veterans did not become homeless again and to explain the program so that the veterans understood the process.

Apart from her work on the VASH caseload, Dawn also took on the added responsibility of serving as chair of the Employee Recognition Committee. In this role, she plans and organizes quarterly luncheons where staff are recognized and appreciated for their good work. Dawn decorates everyone's work area and bakes a sweet dessert on each staff's birthday. This is another example of how she is thoughtful and goes the extra mile.

She is truly an excellent housing staff member worth the recognition.

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Employee of the Year: Housing Maintenance

Building Maintenance Foreman, City of Phoenix Housing Department

Johnmark Bradley is a Modernization team member who excels in his job performance. He is assigned to the Modernization Section of the City of Phoenix Housing Department and is responsible for supervising ten staff composed Building Maintenance Workers and Trades Helpers. The team focuses on rehabilitation projects within the Department's housing portfolio of over 2,300 units. He has assisted with capital improvements, rehabilitation projects and various special projects on all of our properties. He regularly performs beyond expectations and really makes a difference in the Modernization Section and Housing Department. It was a challenging year for our section, but Johnmark was the most steadfast, dependable and dedicated member of our team. He is well liked and respected by all the City Housing staff, vendors and contractors that we work with, and that's not an easy thing to accomplish.

During fiscal year 2013-14, in addition to his regular workload, Johnmark picked up the challenge of a newly created vacancy crew and ran with it. The special crew helped assist our Property Management Section reduce a large number of vacancies within a short time frame. Johnmark always has a positive attitude and a get it done approach to accomplishing our modernization projects. He brings a special touch and commitment to everything he works on. He is always flexible in accepting job assignments with many of them beyond his job description. He has an extensive knowledge base in construction and is an invaluable resource when defining our plans and projects. He has effectively kept our projects on track and continues to look out for the best interests of the department and our residents.

He is an important team member of the Modernization Section and he continues to expand his involvement in modernization projects. MICHELE PAYAKOVICH

Senior Grants Program Specialist, Scottsdale Community Assistance Office

ichele Payakovich has worked for Scottsdale's Community Assistance Office (CAO) since 2006. During this time, Michele has performed various duties and responsibilities from casework, PIC submission, waitlist coordination, portability, repayments, file review and tech partner and has taken on various other duties as they arose. She has had a positive attitude in taking on new responsibilities and readily assists her coworkers with issues from computer malfunction to front desk coverage.

Michele keeps the client at the forefront. Recently when a port client came to Scottsdale without money for food or a deposit for her new unit, Michele did not just give the client referrals for organizations that could assist the client; she worked with the organizations directly to ensure the client received the best possible assistance. Michele has organized office food drives to provide food for our local Community Action Program (CAP) office, Vista del Camino. Michele also volunteers to conduct eligibility interviews for special programs such as Back to School and Adopt a Family

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that are offered through Vista del Camino.

Michele is not just attentive to the client, she is attentive to the details of her work. This past vear the CAO sent purge letters to all waitlist clients. A second purge notice was sent to all nonresponders by restricted mail. During this process Michele noticed discrepancies in the signature on the restricted cards that were returned to the CAO. Michele compiled all returned receipts (a tedious task) and then worked with the City of Scottsdale mailroom to verify with the United States Postal Service that the mailings were not being handled properly. Because of Michele's attention to detail and commitment to best practices, the CAO was able to recoup almost \$500 from the USPS.

Innovative Program of the Year: Housing

SECTION 8 DIVISION STAFF

City of Phoenix Housing Department

taff of the Section 8 program came together on March 1, 2013 to problem-solve the issue of file errors as a result of not obtaining all or part of the 3rd party verifications. The staff brainstormed innovative ideas and developed a model in which staff were divided into verifiers and caseload leads. The verifiers would be responsible for reviewing annual packets, pulling EIV, DES and verifications for annual recertifications. The caseload leads would review the file and complete the annual recertification. This was implemented in July 2013. File reviews done between May and July 2014 demonstrated staff increased their error-free rate of 67% in 2011/12 to 90% for 2013/14.

The innovative approach highlights what can be accomplished when staff work together to find a solution and implement it as a team.

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FSS Participant of the Year

JUDITH V. FSS Participant City of Phoenix

and 5. She joined FSS in July 2011. At that time she was working part-time doing odd jobs. Her annual income was \$7,020. Judith was a long-time victim of domestic violence. Her husband tried to murder her by strangling her with a computer cable in front of her children. Her husband also sent people to threaten her family at gunpoint; they were told if Judith did not return to him, her family would be harmed. While seeking safety at a shelter in 2008, her husband found her. She was then transferred to another shelter. She was constantly moving between Phoenix, Tucson, and Nogales. After years of running from her abuser, Judith was able to find safety within subsidized housing. Because of the severity of the crimes committed against her, she was granted a U Visa. This Visa is granted to those who have suffered severe abuse due to a crime, and are willing to help law enforcement authorities in the investigation or prosecution of the criminal activity.

Prior to joining FSS, Judith had not had a steady job or stable work history. She has now been employed for the past three years, going from a part-time temporary status to now a full-time position.

Judith entered the FSS Program with the goal of homeownership. She had no credit history when she joined FSS. She completed financial education classes, met with credit counselors and attended homeownership and home maintenance classes. Judith worked hard to increase her credit score to 668. She was approved for a home loan in July 2013. Judith saved her tax refunds and diligently made monthly deposits to her savings account. She has saved \$19,000 for the purchase of her first home. She also opened an Individual Development Account through Newtown Community Development Corporation Community Land Trust. This will allow her to access 3:1 matching down payment assistance up to \$15,000. She will be closing on her new home as soon as repairs to the home have been completed.

Judith is optimistic and determined to continue moving forward regardless of the challenges she faces. When she joined FSS she had been taking ESL classes, but the language barrier continued to be an obstacle. At that time, FSS did not have a bilingual caseworker. This did not discourage Judith. She took ESL classes, and brought an interpreter to her appointments. Judith attended all appointments and followed through on all of her goals. Judith has demonstrated determination and perseverance. She is efficient, resourceful, and has excellent follow through. She is usually on the phone and following through with tasks before she has even left the parking lot after meeting with her FSS caseworker.

Judith has been a model FSS participant. She came to the United States in hopes of finding a better future. Despite the many barriers she faced, she has accomplished so much. She is looking forward to giving back to the place that has given her so much. We are very proud of Judith and all of her accomplishments and are happy to recommend her as the FSS Participant of the Year.

Mark Bethel Memorial Scholarship Award

JUAN JAUREGUI

Facilities Maintenance Worker III, Yuma County Housing Department

uan Juaregui has been employed with the Yuma County Housing Department (YCHD) as a facilities maintenance worker since September 24, 1993. He has been promoted to a higher grade and is currently assigned as the maintenance tead man, assisting the facilities maintenance supervisor in the day to day operation of the maintenance division. The maintenance division is responsible for maintenance, repair and modernization of public housing units, offices, vehicles and grounds, as well as operations of the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants.

Juan's worth and value to this department extends beyond his outstanding technical competence. The most notable example of this was his significant contribution toward the rating of 96 points (out of 100) received from a HUD building inspector for maintaining each and every development in a condition equal to or greater than Home Quality Standards (HQS) and the Uniform Physical Condition Standards (UPCS) requirements. He was responsible in maintaining the Moctezuma apartments in San Luis, Arizona. These units received higher marks during that inspection. For this reason, the housing department was exempt from HQS inspection for another two years.

The excuses: "I don't have time.", "My job keeps me too busy.", "Hey look, that generic show about that thing is on."

What you should do

Really the most important question to answer when doing anything is: Why?

In 15 minutes you can make decisions that will affect your life and make you feel better doing it. Just the act of taking action in your life can help make you happier about your future and where it's going — because it's going somewhere.

Think about it: a quarter of an hour, 15 minutes, 900 seconds can make you feel better about the next year, 365 days, 21,900 seconds. If it helps, picture some late-night infomercial host saying, "for just 15 minutes a day..."

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

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

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
